Holly Elissa Bruno, MA, JD, best-selling and award-winning author, international keynote speaker and radio host specializes in emotionally intelligent leadership. She served as Assistant Attorney General for the state of Maine and Assistant Dean at the University of Maine-Augusta School of Law. An alumna of Harvard University's Institute for Educational Management, she teaches leadership courses for Wheelock College, now part of Boston University, and most recently in Singapore.

Holly Elissa's just released book, *Happiness Is Running Through the Streets to Find You: Translating Trauma's Harsh Legacy Into Healing*, " offers useful insights and heartfelt examples of facing trauma with HOPE, not terror. Her book *The Comfort of Little Things* received the Living Now Award for books that "uplift the quality of life". Her current writing focuses on transforming childhood trauma into healing wisdom. Her ground-breaking first book, *Leading on Purpose* was published by McGraw-Hill in 2008. Its sequel, *What You Need to Lead: Emotional Intelligence in Practice* has been one of NAEYC's (National Association for the Education of Young Children) best-sellers. She is a frequent contributor to *Child Care information exchange* and her articles appear in NAEYC's *Young children* journal.

Holly's keynote topic "Learning from the Bumps in the Road: Turning Potholes into Grand Possibilities" reminds us to "practice strategies to help us regain our footing, reclaim our confidence, rekindle our joy and humor, and turn potholes into grand opportunities."
